About youth work's mission, DNA and challenges



here are these moments you'll never forget.

The smells, feelings and faces are carved in your memory.

Youth work makes a difference in the young people's lives.

And it has an impact on their future lives. That's what we see and hear on a daily basis. 'De Ambrassade' went to every nook and cranny of youth work to ask the question: why does youth work actually work? We see and say that youth work is important ... but do we really know why #YouthWorkWorks? Why it functions, has impact, is worth its while?

ifficult. Because ask 100 youth workers and young people what youth work means to them and you get 100 different answers, 100 different ways to describe it, 100 different stories. Half of all children and young people in Flanders and Brussels come into contact with youth work or take an active role in one of the 6000+ different youth work initiatives.

We were looking for common elements in youth work practices: what connects us? We were not looking for a strict definition of youth work, because definitions delineate and exclude initiatives that are just that tiny bit different or more experimental. And that is one of the powers of youth work: starting from the base and giving space to young people.

Ok, but what is youth work then? Youth work is a place where children and young people can be young, where they experience the positive power of a group, where they can grow at their own rhythm, where they can make friends and learn by experience.

Youth work is an attitude that resolutely puts children and young people at the centre. Youth work is playful, crazy, creative, diverse ...

Youth work has always been in motion. And the last few years, it is increasingly active at the crossroads with education, culture, sports and wellbeing. Youth work takes diverse shapes and works with diverse target groups. Youth work is experimental and it gives children and young people a voice. Youth work offers powerful experiences for and by children and young people. These experiences are very unique, yet very universal, thanks to the power of the group, thanks to a first taste of truly taking up responsibility and commitment.

Youth work doesn't exist for itself, it exists to empower children and young people. The challenges for children, young people and their organisations are growing.

To ensure that youth work keeps its power in the future, that it continues to develop and that it addresses these challenges, it is important that:

- every youth worker can tell the powerful story about what makes youth work so strong,
- policy makers invest A LOT more in children, young people and their organisations,
- there can be more youth work.

Therefore, De Ambrassade – together with many youth workers - developed a language to express the value of youth work. Get to know the mission of youth work, the DNA of the youth worker and 5 challenges for the future that we want to address. Together with you!

### **Mission** statement

here do children and young people truly get space in our society? When are they allowed to fail? Does their voice really matter? Or do they simply have to wait until they have grown up? Do they get the space to develop their own leisure-time projects as they desire? Still far too little.

In youth work, we do create that space. We build spaces with children and young people and promote the right to experimenting, to participation, to development and to leisure time adapted to each young person. Even the Convention on the Rights of the Child says: 'Every child is entitled to grow and develop' ( $\rightarrow$  article 6), 'Every child is entitled to an own opinion, and people should take it into account' ( $\rightarrow$  article 12 and 13) and 'Every child is entitled to free time, to play and to participate in cultural and artistic activities' ( $\rightarrow$  article 31).

That's why we say that youth work is a right for ALL children and young people. Because everybody is entitled to feel young and to get as much space as possible to do so. That's why we need more youth work and why our society needs to choose to invest more in children, young people and youth work.

#### Mission

Youth work's mission is to actively create space for four specific rights of children and young people. That's how every child and young person will get more space to be young.

- young people are fully-fledged citizens in society.
  Youth work associations help making that possible.
  Through information, co-creation and co-decision.
- the right to free time, leisure, cultural and artistic activities: youth work is the place where children and young people can take part in numerous types of leisure-time activities. In which they can experience and create culture.
- the right to develop and to grow up together: youth work is part of the integral development of children and young people, as an educational environment.

#### YOUTH WORK AS A WAY OF LIVING, THINKING, LOOKING ...

 $\langle \bigvee \rangle$  hether they are paid staff or volunteers, all youth workers are equipped with a specific DNA that you can only experience or learn in youth work. Indeed, youth work is playful, creative, dirty, rebellious, alive and kicking, passionate, wacko ... But youth work is above all an attitude: the way you live and look at society. Not because you have to, but because you want to. If everybody in contact with children and young people lets their inner youth worker out, we will be moving towards a society that empowers children and young people. Not top-down, but rather bottom-up. Not starting from unequal power positions, but from active ownership and critical citizenship.

### **#YOUTHWORKWORKS**

#### BECAUSE YOUTH WORKERS ...

- consistently put children and young people at the centre: youth workers always start from the realities of children and young people. Youth workers offer children and young people their own space in society, based on their capacities and desires, geared towards their own interests.
- give children and young people ownership: children and young people can take care of activities, group dynamics, organisation, processes and experiments by themselves. They are equal to their youth leaders, coordinators and professional youth workers.
  - pay attention to both process and product: together with children and young people, youth workers work towards a product. But the road to get to that result is just as valuable. Cycles of reflection and action alternate. People learn and progress through dialogue, experience and group processes.

- **use the power of group dynamics**: youth work connects children and young people by cooperating, through shared interests, by meeting, by building networks and communities. Youth work creates the feeling that you belong and stimulates openness for other opinions and habits.
- **co-create society**: youth workers help children and young people grow up as active, committed citizens in society. They reflect with children and young people about the neighbourhood or (local) policy, they take initiatives that bring people closer together ...

So, dear youth worker, it isn't all that difficult to explain what makes youth work so special. Be proud of your DNA and use it on a daily basis. 🗢

### Challenges

MORE PRESSURE MEANS
MORE POWER
Challenges set our agenda

he society in which
#YouthWorkWorks is changing
and poses new challenges.
No month passes without new figures
about children and young people in
difficult situations: 1 out of 10 has
fewer opportunities, 1 out of 5 is
unemployed, 1 out of 10 young people
drops out of school, ever more young
people survive thanks to the help
of social welfare services.

Youth work cannot solve these issues on its own, but it can contribute and cooperate to increase the opportunities for children and young people. So what youth work is and how youth work works, changes along with the bigger complex challenges.





### PRESSURE ON CONSCIOUS COMMITMENT

We owe the rich variety of youth work in Flanders and Brussels to hundreds of thousands of volunteers throughout history. Without them, it isn't possible. Young people commit time next to their studies and work, and they are interested to care for others. Because they find it important. But that commitment has changed a lot over the last decades: less time with the same organisation, fewer strings attached, more dependent on their personal interests.





#### EXPERIMENTING

### PRESSURE ON LEISURE TIME AND SOCIAL SPACE

Young people feel a lot of pressure on their free time. They constantly need to make the 'correct' and the most 'useful' choices. This causes leisure-time stress. There is very little time for real 'down time'. What's more, there is also literally little space for them. Places where they can truly play are disappearing. And fewer things are 'allowed'. Grown-ups see more risks, want to protect, make more rules and control more.

## PRESSURE ON OLD MODELS IN A SUPER-DIVERSE SOCIETY

Diversity is reality. Young people grow up in a super-diverse society: so many backgrounds, opinions and individual needs. We painstakingly search for a way to handle this diversity, especially in the cities. Old models and organisational formats don't always work to get through to all groups. If youth work is to offer opportunities for ALL children and young people, there should be more youth work. More different types of youth work, more support for these formats and a smooth cooperation between them.

## PRESSURE ON THE SOCIETY IN WHICH CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE GROW UP

The pressure on children and young people and the complexity of our society has increased dramatically over the last years. That's why it is ever more important for different policy domains to work together to strengthen the position of children and young people. The target group should be put first, not the structures. Youth work starts from children and young people and follows them in all spheres of life: leisure time, school, finding a job, resilience in difficult situations.

At the crossroads of these spheres of life, youth work can break down walls

and cooperate with other sectors. Youth work reduces the complexity for children and young people by building bridges with other sectors. Youth work teaches the other sectors to see things from children's and young people's perspective.

Strong youth policy starts from the reality of children and young people, and not from sectors and structures.
